- Housing Authority Resolution No. HA-1569
 - Adopted October 16, 2012
 - Requires SDHC to submit a semi-annual report of all grant activity to the Housing Authority

• HUD's FY 2023 Economic Development Initiative – Community Project Funding (CPF)

- The City of San Diego and SDHC worked in partnership with U.S. Representative Juan Vargas' office (District 52) to seek \$850,000 to help complete predevelopment work for the densification of Casa Colina Phase I in City Heights.
- A similar request was made with U.S. Senator Alex Padilla for \$1.5 million and with U.S. Representative Scott Peters (District 50) for \$1 million for capital improvements to convert publicly owned, unused office space at SDHC's headquarters into a shelter for transition-age youth experiencing homelessness.

SDHC – Semi-Annual Grant Informational Report Economic Impact

- 36 sub-recipient agreements totaling \$36,749,944.
 - For existing programs to address homelessness, including shelters, permanent supportive housing, rapid rehousing, case management, outreach, storage centers, and system navigation.
- Five contracts executed totaling \$344,839 from the HUD Capital Fund program.
 - For maintenance and upgrades at **four** properties owned and managed by SDHC and/or its nonprofit affiliate, Housing Development Partners.
